Stop Signs and Turns

A common driving/traffic issue deals with a driver's response to being stopped at a stop sign. In the previous article, the issue of WHERE drivers are supposed to stop at a stop sign was addressed, i.e., behind a marked line, or, behind a crosswalk.

A closely related issue, is the question of HOW LONG must I remain stopped at a stop sign? Now to speak of situations where a stop sign is present for drivers on one roadway, and where there are no stop signs for drivers on an intersecting/ crossing roadway.

For drivers who are facing a stop sign, merely stopping is not enough. Drivers who have stopped at a stop sign must <u>remain</u> <u>stopped</u> until it is safe to move onward away from the stop sign, whether turning right or left, or proceeding straight. This means drivers at stop signs must wait for all other traffic on the uncontrolled roadway to safely pass, since those drivers do not have stop signs. Those drivers always have the right of way.

Barely stopping at a stop sign, then abruptly pulling out, cutting off other drivers and causing them to have to slow down and apply braking to avoid a collision is unlawful, and is a citable offense. It's a simple concept: drivers at stop signs must wait and be sure that all other traffic on an uncontrolled roadway is not so close so as to constitute an immediate safety conflict.

Regarding turns from one street or roadway onto another, or into a driveway, or into the parking lot of a local business. The legal requirement is drivers must signal for at least 100 feet BEFORE making a turn. This is a matter of both safety, and courtesy, to let other drivers on the road know what you're intending to do. The same 100 foot rule applies to changing lanes: the law requires at least 100 feet of signal BEFORE moving from one lane into an adjacent lane.

At the end of the day, the above laws are intended to provide safety to drivers, bicyclists, and pedestrians. At the heart of these laws lies the idea of driver patience, attentiveness, and diligence. If drivers exercise these three attributes, keeping in mind the above laws and rules of the road, it helps make everyone safer on our streets.

My power went out... What do I do?

We pride ourselves in the delivery of affordable and dependable power. On occasion the weather, accidents and other unpredictable situations occur that we can't control. Your safety is important to us.

Look around and see if the street lights are out and if your neighbors' lights are on.

If they are on it is most likely something at your home such as a circuit overload.

CHECK YOUR FUSES AND BREAKERS FIRST. If this is the cause of your power outage, contact an electrician. **DO NOT CALL 9-1-1.** If the problem is due to your private electrical components and it is after business hours that you call for a crew to come out you may be assessed a fee.

If the neighborhood lights are off and your circuit breakers are not tripped, it is most likely something outside your home. Stay inside unless you can visually inspect and see that there are no power lines down on the ground. Check with your neighbors on a landline phone and designate one household to call the outage in to the city. This helps to keep emergencyphone lines open. During office hours you can contact us at 938-5531. After hours call police dispatch at 938-5511. This does not need to be a 9-1-1 call.



Attention dog owners of Milton-Freewater: 2022 dog licenses are for sale now at the Milton-Freewater Police Department. The dog licenses are \$10 if your pet is spayed or neutered and \$35 if not. Please bring proof of a current rabies vaccination with you from a licensed veterinarian. A late fee of \$10 will be assessed to each dog license purchased beginning March 1, 2022.
