

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENT TO SEWER PLANT FACILITY Update from City Manager Linda Hall

A comprehensive and encompassing project will soon be underway at the City's wastewater treatment facility.

It all started when the plant's sewer digester (which operates like the "stomach" of the facility) developed a very large structural crack. Crews immediately took measures to protect the facility and temporarily fix the problem, but the Public Works Superintendent and PW Supervisor knew we were facing a very big problem. The Department of Environmental Quality was notified, as they are the regulatory agency that permits our facility to operate.

The City has been working in conjunction with the DEQ under special conditions to operate our plant, until we can get our repairs completed. The City Council instructed staff to carefully study the issue, so that all options for repair were considered. We wanted to make sure not only this issue was solved, but hopefully improve the overall function and efficiency of the plant for now and future generations.

The results of this comprehensive study were that several improvements were needed to our plant, and not just the repair of the digester. Estimates were prepared and a price tag of \$3.305 million was the total estimated cost. Staff immediately set about seeking funding sources, so as to keep any impact on our citizens' rates as minimal as possible.

To our great delight, we were successful to a large degree! We were able to secure a TWO MILLION DOLLAR GRANT, and the balance of \$1.305 million will be paid with a low interest loan. The sources for these programs are through our State of Oregon Lottery Funds and also Federal Funds from the Oregon Community Development Block Grant Program. We are very grateful for these funds! We may still need to raise our sewer rates, but anticipate any increase will be minimal.

We are expecting construction on the plant facility to begin this summer and take approximately a year to complete. The result will be a much more efficiently operating plant with sufficient capacity to serve the future of Milton-Freewater residents as well.

Crosswalk upgrades in Milton-Freewater Information from ODOT for OR Hwy 11 (Columbia St.) / NE First Ave intersection

The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) is installing crosswalk upgrades in Milton-Freewater at the intersection of OR Hwy 11 (Columbia Street) and NE First Ave where the existing traffic signal is located. Three new Rapid Flash Beacons will be installed with a raised pedestrian refuge/median in the center lane of the five-lane road. Curb extensions, ADA upgrades and other improvements that will make this crossing safer for pedestrians and motor vehicles. The existing traffic signal and overhead wires will be removed once the new beacons and upgrades are installed. Work on the project began mid-February. The new beacons will be activated in March or April.

The existing traffic signal will soon be considered inadequate and won't meet federal standards. Because the signal does not face NE First Ave motorists may fail to see that someone is crossing OR Hwy 11.

The new Rapid Flash Beacon emits light in all directions and will easily be seen by motorists on OR 11 as well as NE First Ave, providing greater visibility than the existing traffic signal. The pedestrian refuge in the middle of the highway where the turn lane now exists will also provide a safe area for persons to stop and wait for traffic before continuing across the multi-lane highway.





Join our Equal Pay Plan – Also known as Budget Plan. Here's how it works...

We compute the amount of your utilities used the previous 12 months (you must have lived at the residence one year). The total of your previous year's utilities along with your account balance at the time of your May statement are divided into 12 equal payments. (Note: If your account balance at the time of your May statement is more than \$50.00 you may not qualify for the Equal Pay Plan.) Your first payment will be on your May statement. Each May your budget payment amount will be recalculated. Adjustments may be made within the budget year (May-April) should the budget amount not cover increased usage. The budget amount is required to be paid as billed. Late, missed or budget amounts not paid in full may cause you to lose the privilege of participating. Your final billing for the budget year will be issued in April and will need to be paid in full unless it is a **CREDIT**.

How do I join? Complete the form below and return it on or before April 18th.

IMPORTANT! If you were on last year's EQUAL PAY PLAN, you will be put on next year's plan automatically, if your account balance at the time of your May statement is less than \$50.00. Should you NOT wish to continue on the plan please note below.

Crosswalk upgrades in Milton-Freewater - continued from page 1

How the new crosswalk flashing beacons operate:

• Pedestrian pushes the button near crossing sign when they are ready to cross the street.

When activated, the beacon will begin flashing alternating yellow colored lights similar to the pace of a strobe light.
When lights are flashing and/or when pedestrians are present at crosswalk, motorists need to stop ahead of the intersection.
Once all vehicles are stopped the pedestrian can travel across the roadway.

• Vehicles are safe to travel after all pedestrians have passed through the lane they are **using plus one additional lane**. Similar beacons installed throughout the state and across the country are helping reduce vehicle vs. pedestrian crashes. ODOT and the City of Milton-Freewater urge pedestrians and motorists to pay extra attention in the area as everyone becomes accustom to this safety feature and the traffic signal changes.

Successful operation of the crossing signal requires cooperation and understanding by both the pedestrian and drivers of motorized vehicles.

• Pedestrians should make eye contact with drivers and ensure their vehicles have come to a complete stop before crossing the highway.

• Even if the light is activated, it is not safe to cross the highway until all vehicles are stopped. Drivers and pedestrians need to keep a close watch out for each other.

The new flashing beacons are helping to improve crosswalk safety at numerous locations throughout the state. Drivers and pedestrians, however, need to continue to use caution and keep a close watch out for each other.
